

Role Profile for Student Representatives of the Country Boards of the BDA (Country Board Student Representative)

Applicable to Northern Ireland, Wales, Scotland and England Country Board Student Representatives

1. Purpose of Role

The overarching purpose of the role is:

- To contribute to the work of the Country Board, supporting the dietetic profession and the BDA in one of the four nations of the United Kingdom
- To take an active part in the work programme of the Country Board
- To bring a student and future workforce perspective to the discussions and decisions of the Country Board.

The Student Representative is a full voting member of the Country Board, taking a full and active part in Board discussions and decision making.

The role is also intended to be developmental and may support the individual's career development and progression through the experience gained.

2. Essential Criteria

The Country Board Student Representative will be a student member of the British Dietetic Association, enrolled on an HCPC-approved dietetics programme in the relevant country.

3. Key Tasks

The Country Board Student Representative is expected to:

Contribute to the Country Board:

- Take a full and active part in Country Board discussions and decision making, in line with BDA strategy and direction
- Support the promotion of BDA membership in the country
- Help promote the work of the BDA and the roles and work of dietitians and dietetic support workers
- Bring a student and future workforce perspective to the board, particularly on matters that affect students
- Contribute to the development and delivery of the Country Board work plan

Represent the BDA and the profession:

- Represent the Country Board to students and, where asked, support the BDA at events and meetings in the country

Support the work of the board:

- Support consultations with BDA members and students in partnership with the relevant BDA officers and volunteers
- Keep up to date with policy and political matters relevant to the country
- Help identify opportunities to contribute
- Support the BDA staff team in responding to policy matters and consultations as they arise

Take part in the work of the board:

- Attend the meetings of the Country Board (normally four per year) and build effective relationships with the other Country Board members

- Contribute to the Country Board work plan and support the work needed to achieve its objectives
- May be asked to lead on specific pieces of work on behalf of, or with the Board and in agreement with the Country Board Chair

5. Time Commitment:

There are normally four meetings per year, usually two in person and two held virtually via Teams. The Country Board Student Representative will also need to spend some time on ad hoc matters such as emails, working groups, reading papers and leading or contributing to projects as agreed.

6. Term of Office:

The Country Board Student Representative is recruited for a period of 3 years with the opportunity to serve a maximum of two terms of office, or until the term of study comes to an end, whichever is sooner.

7. Remuneration:

All reasonable expenses incurred will be reimbursed. This is a voluntary role and no fee is paid.

8. Induction:

Induction, training and mentoring will be provided by the BDA.
