



This booklet uses easy words and pictures.

You might want to ask someone to help you read it.




You might need a tube in your nose to give you food, drink and medicine.

This is called a NG Tube.



The tube goes up your nose and down your throat to your tummy.



Your nurse will put the tube up your nose.

It won't hurt but might feel uncomfortable.




It might make you feel like you are going to be sick.


This feeling should stop once the tube is in.



The nurse will check that the tube is in the right place in your tummy.



You might need to have an x-ray to check the tube.



The nurse will put a plaster on to hold the tube in place.

Once in place the tube should feel comfortable.



Don't pull the tube, it will move out of place.



Speak to your nurse if you have any questions.
